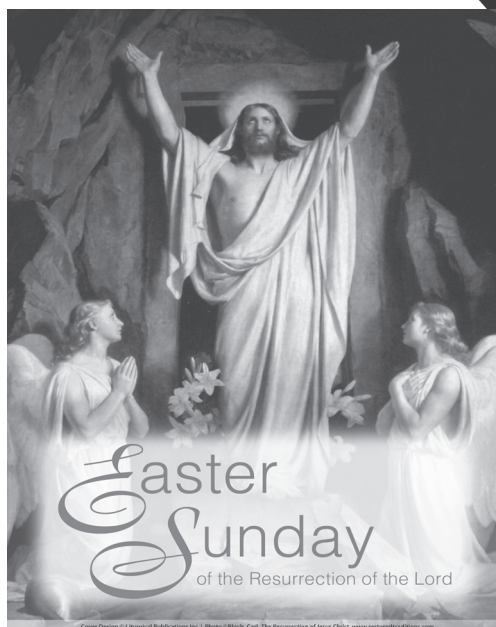

Live the Liturgy

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! We are called, by how we live our lives, to celebrate the risen Christ. How do we do that? Our faith in the resurrection gathers us here today to celebrate this incredible event. The good news is that the doors of eternity are open! We can now understand that the fullness of who we are will be discovered when we one day meet God face-to-face in Heaven. Our faith in the truth of who God is and who we are affects how we live our lives and the decisions we make. We are called to love our neighbor...to love those who hurt us...to work on behalf of the poor and the weak...to be people of justice, integrity, and hope... to practice compassion and mercy above anything else. Our lives are meant to be oriented around the axis of the Gospel. Are they?



Easter Sunday

This Easter, in churches all over the world, people will be fully initiated in the Catholic Church. Those who have come from another Christian denomination have already begun their journey with Jesus Christ. But for those who are baptized at the Easter Vigil, a new reality has come to pass. Each newly baptized man, woman, and child have become new creations in Jesus Christ. They have died and risen with the one who rose on the third day and whose empty tomb we celebrate every Easter. Easter Sunday morning, they awake after many months of RCIA and all have the same question before them: "Now what?"

Christ is Risen ! Alleluia !

The Sacred Paschal Triduum is the greatest feast of the Christian Passover. It is one great feast which lasts three days as one continuous liturgy. This most solemn feast starts the evening of Holy Thursday with the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood of Christ. On this evening we gather around Christ, thanking Jesus for the gift of the Holy Mass and Holy Communion. We embrace the Body and Blood of Christ. A significant part of this ceremony is the rite of washing the feet, just as Jesus washed the feet of the Apostles thus expressing his great love for them. God Himself washes the feet of man. Leans over him in a gesture of His humble service and love for man. When we remember this event in our daily life, it is a reminder to respect and love our neighbor even more. The second day of the Sacred Paschal Triduum is Good Friday, the day of His Passion, death on the Cross and burial. On this day the Church does not celebrate the Mass because Christ Himself is the sacrifice, His Body and Blood shed on the cross. This is the day when we fast and reflect on the Passions of our Lord Jesus Christ. We come to the Cross of Jesus, meditating upon the Way of the Cross, and we mourn our sins at the tomb of our Savior. Good Friday is a time of silence, meditation, prayer, and stand on Calvary and the tomb of the Lord.

On Holy Saturday, we do not celebrate the Mass because Christ is entombed in the grave. We adore the Blessed Sacrament, which is placed in the Repository, a symbolic tomb of the Lord. In the afternoon on this day churches are filled with people who bring their baskets filled with foods which symbolize the sacrifices that were made and the new life we are given through Christ's death and resurrection. Families will share these blessed foods at their Easter Sunday breakfast celebration. On Holy Saturday, when the day ends and the dawning of darkness begins, the most important liturgy of Christianity - Easter Vigil starts. It is the Mother of all liturgies throughout the Christian world, the central event of our faith, the Main Feast of the year. This is great prayer to celebrate the greatest night of the Liturgical Year, the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Light of Christ defeats the darkness of sin, night is overcome by the day of the Resurrection. Life conquers death. After mourning the Passion, death and burial of Jesus, we now celebrate the victory of His Resurrection. In the Liturgy of the Easter Vigil, we are overjoyed during this holy night. The catechumens are immersed in the waters of Baptism and we rejoice as we renew our baptismal vows. We sing as we proclaim - Christ is truly risen from the dead, He has defeated death.

May this Easter Joy never leave our hearts, our families, our churches and our country. After suffering and death comes resurrection. After a terrible night of darkness comes the joy of a bright, luminous morning. After the great failures of our lives comes the victory of Christ in us.

Let us remember the mystery of our faith, do not forget it, just us live it every day. Easter Sunday comes again to the Church to continue the Lord's Resurrection Celebration. The Sacred Paschal Triduum ends in the late afternoon on Easter Sunday with prayers called Vespers.

Dear parishioners and guests, no one is left out of this Sacred Paschal Triduum celebrated in our church. I wish you a happy and joyful Easter. May the Risen Christ bless all of us.

ALLELUIA
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Chrystus Zmartwychwstał ! Prawdziwie Powstał !

Drodzy Parafianie,

Święte Tridum Paschalne to największe święto chrześcijańskie, trwające jako jedna wielka uroczystość naszej wiary. Rozpoczyna się wieczorem w Wielki Czwartek ustanowieniem przez Jezusa Sakramentu Eucharystii i Kapłaństwa. W ten wieczór gromadzimy się wokół Chrystusa, dziękując Jezusowi za dar Mszy i Komunii świętej, przyjmując Ciało i Krew Chrystusa. Szczególnym znakiem tej uroczystości jest obrzęd obmycia nóg, tak jak Jezus obmył stopy Apostołom, wyrażając w ten sposób swoją wielką miłość do swoich uczniów. Bóg myje nogi człowiekowi, pochyla się nad nim w geście jego pokornej służby i miłości dla człowieka. Pamiętajmy o tym wydarzeniu w naszym codziennym życiu aby jeszcze bardziej szanować i kochać bliźniego.

Drugi dzień Triduum Paschalnego to Wielki Piątek, dzień Jego Męki, śmierci na krzyżu i pogrzebania. W tym dniu Kościół nie sprawuje mszy świętej ponieważ sam Chrystus wydaje siebie na ofiarę ciała i krwi Pańskiej na krzyżu. To dzień kiedy pościmy i rozważamy Mękę Pana naszego Jezusa Chrystusa. Przychodzimy pod krzyż Jezusa, rozważając Drogę Krzyżową oraz oplakujemy nasze grzechy u grobu naszego Zbawiciela. Wielki Piątek to czas ciszy, zadumy, postu, modlitwy, czuwania na Golgocie i przy grobie Pańskim.

W Wielką Sobotę również nie sprawujemy Mszy świętej ponieważ Chrystus znajduje się w grobie. Adorujemy Najświętszy Sakrament, który wystawiamy w kościele w symbolicznym grobie pańskim. W tym dniu popołudniu świątynia wypełnia się ludźmi, którzy przynoszą w koszykach pokarmy do poświęcenia na uroczyste śniadanie paschalne w Niedzielę Wielkanocną. Kolejny już rok w naszej parafii św. Stanisława Kostki wszystkich nas i pokarmy pobłogosławił ordynariusz diecezji Rochester NY ks. biskup Salvatore Matano.

W sobotę, kiedy kończy się dzień i nastaje ciemność rozpoczyna się najważniejsza liturgia chrześcijaństwa – Wigilia Paschalna. To matka wszystkich Wigilii chrześcijańskich, to centralne wydarzenie naszej wiary, to główna uroczystość każdego roku liturgicznego. Tą jedną wielką modlitwą celebруем w nocy zwaną Wielką Nocą tj Wielkanoc. Zmartwychwstania naszego Pana Jezusa Chrystusa. Światłość Chrystusa oświeca ciemność grzechu, noc zostaje pokonana przez dzień Zmartwychwstania. Życie zwycięża śmierć. Po oplakaniu męki, śmierci i pogrzebu Jezusa, radujemy się jego Zmartwychwstaniem celebrując Liturgię Wigilii Paschalnej. Radujemy się, że w tą świętą noc, katechumeni przyjmują chrzest, że odnawiamy nasze przyrzeczenia chrzcielne, śpiewając—Chrystus prawdziwie Zmartwychwstał, pokonał śmierć. Niech wielkanocna Radość nigdy, nie skończy się w naszych sercach, naszych rodzinach, kościołach. Po cierpieniu i śmierci przychodzi Zmartwychwstanie. Po ciemnej nocy przychodzi radość poranka. Po wielkich błędach i porażkach naszego życia przychodzi zwycięstwo Chrystusa w nas. Pamiętajmy o tej tajemnicy naszej wiary, nie zapominajmy jej, po prostu żyjmy ją każdego dnia. W Niedzielę Wielkanocną ponownie przychodzimy do kościoła, aby kontynuować świętowanie Zmartwychwstania Pańskiego. Triduum Paschalne trzydniowa Uroczystość

kończy się w Niedzielę Zmartwychwstania, późnym popołudniem, modlitwą zwaną nieszporama.

Drodzy parafianie i drodzy goście aby nikogo z nas nie zabrakło przy naszym wspólnym celebrowaniu Świąt Wielkanocnych. Niech Zmartwychwstały Chrystus błogosławi nas, nasze rodziny i naszą parafię.

Alleluja ! Chrystus Zmartwychwstał ! Z modlitwą !
